




SCENIC TRAIL RIDE AT RUNNYMEDE SANCTUARY

EMERGENCY CONTACT INFORMATION FOR LARGE/FARM ANIMALS ONLY:

For months LAPS received several calls that this guy has been terrorizing people and vehicles along Lower Valley Road outside of Parkesburg. Finally, being viewed grazing in someone's front yard a plan was devised with homeowner to trap the sheep in his fenced in back yard. Investigation found this ram came from a rental property that had non-sheep fencing –so constantly touring the neighborhood and not being able to get caught by owner.

Owner had inherited him with the property and willingly signed him over to LAPS. After an "eventful" capture, this pretty feral ram found himself in a LAPS stall with a hair-



cut and 2 less "ram parts". Currently living with an older ewe Erin, released to LAPS a week earlier–both are looking for a retirement home to graze on–WITH GOOD FENCING!

LAPS received a very generous anonymous donation that made it possible for this new tractor to find a new home on the Farm!



Currently LAPS has fielded 43 calls for 2023 that pertain to the Cruelty Law:

COUNTLESS CALLS ABOUT CATS, DOGS AND CHICKENS UNFORTUNATELY. And then there is probably cause...

Increased development in our area has led to many calls with no probable cause to investigate but to educate – the caller!

Not familiar with the keeping of large animals and farming, many calls are made with good intention but... animals lie down and sleep, cows hide their calves – not abandoning them, not all breeds of horses/cattle are fat and round – ribs may show, and blankets worn in the summer are fly sheets.

LAPS is not a 911 service – a veterinarian needs to be called

Animal Control for loose animals / police if animals are in roadway.

Township Regulations determine the number of animals per acreage, fencing, manure piles and if large animals are permitted.

LAPS addresses the neglect of veterinary care, food and appropriate shelter according to the Cruelty Law not how people think/feel/believe/have seen done.

Neglect takes time to prove – is this skinny horse better or worse from the original call and exam?

No Trespassing signs apply to HSPOs

LAPS is NOT a government funded or run organization – Volunteers run with income from public donations and grants.



THE BEST THING



When volunteering at my first LAPS trail ride, I had the pleasure of meeting many wonderful horses and riders. One horse/rider team that really stood out was Maureen and her horse Timmy.

Little did I know that she had adopted Timmy from LAPS as a foal and he is now 18 years young. He was just a baby when she got him and she told me "he is the best thing that ever happened to me". Miles of trail rides, fox hunting, they have put hoofprints throughout OH, WV, KTY, VA and ME.

A crooked legged, chestnut, TB colt and owners unable to provide the veterinary services needed, Tim was released to LAPS 17 years ago then to Maureen whose care grew him to 17 hands high!
